

Unit 25: Sumo Wrestling

25A : Comprehension

Sumo wrestling is the national sport of Japan. It was originally a religious ritual performed to the gods to wish for a good harvest. Ritual is therefore an important part of the sport. Unlike many other sports, the winner shows no expression of joy upon winning a match. 1

At first glance, sumo wrestling seems to be a strange sport with big, fat wrestlers wearing diaper-like aprons shoving each other inside a tiny ring. Contrary to its appearance, sumo wrestling is a sport that requires not only strength, but also speed and agility, which heavyset people usually do not possess. 5



Wrestlers try to push each other out of the ring or down on the floor. Before actual physical contact, wrestlers will stare at each other for minutes to break the concentration of the opponent. The fight usually lasts for only a few seconds but sometimes can go up to two or three minutes. 10 15

The size of the wrestler is important. The heavier the wrestler, the lower his center of gravity, thus the harder to push or toss him out of the ring. In order to put on weight and build up body mass, sumo wrestlers eat a high-protein stew and a large amount of food, and they go to bed right after eating. The heaviest sumo wrestler on record was 225 kilograms. Despite their large size and heavy weight, sumo wrestlers are well-trained athletes. They live in special sumo stables following extremely strict rules and doing chores besides working out. Wrestlers live in a lifestyle that is completely dedicated to the sport as they are considered role models. Sumo is a way of life as well as a sport. 20 25

Sumo wrestling is a hierarchical sport. Promotions depend on winning records. The more matches a wrestler wins, the more quickly he can move up the rankings. Once a wrestler moves up to the top rank, he is not supposed to lose at all. He is expected to retire if he is unable to maintain a winning record. 30

Sumo wrestling is one of the oldest martial arts in Japan, and it is still the major sport that attracts both men and women in Japan. In fact, it is becoming

more and more popular outside Japan; men from different countries are coming to Japan and being trained to be sumo wrestlers.

Nevertheless, as a sport, sumo is not without controversy. It has been criticized as discriminatory since participants are limited to men only. Not only are women excluded from being sumo wrestlers, they are also prohibited from entering the wrestling ring as it is regarded traditionally as a violation of the purity of the ring. Sumo wrestling, being a religion-originated sport in which traditions are strictly observed, is unlikely to have drastic changes in the near future. It probably will be a long time before one can see a female sumo wrestler.

25B : Grammar & Usage

(1) Double Negatives

When we use two words with negative meanings in a sentence, it is called double negatives.

➤ **Double Negatives = Positive**

Double negatives have the same meaning as affirmative. Usually, such an expression conveys a weaker affirmative than would be conveyed by the corresponding positive adverb or adjective.

Example from the passage:

As a sport, sumo is **not without** controversy.

‘not’ and ‘without’ both have negative meanings; using them together conveys an affirmative meaning. However, the meaning is weaker than saying ‘sumo is a controversial sport’.

More examples:

- ◆ It is **not uncommon** to see double negatives in English.
- ◆ She is **not an infrequent** customer.
- ◆ I haven’t heard of this book, but the author is **not unknown** to me.

Although many grammar books advise students to avoid using double negatives, it is acceptable to use two negative words to create a positive meaning when we can do so in a correct way.

➤ **Double Negatives = Negative**

Sometimes, the use of double negatives still conveys negative meanings. This is mostly used when speaking in order to give emphasis to the negative meaning. You may have come across such usage in lyrics or in movie dialogues. E.g. The Rolling Stones: ‘I **can’t** get **no** satisfaction.’ (=I can’t get any satisfaction.)

Pink Floyd: ‘We **don’t** need **no** education.’ (=We don’t need any education.)

Keep in mind that *using double negatives to convey negative meanings is not considered proper or standard in English. Students should avoid using double negatives to convey negative meanings in writing.*

(2) once

‘once’ (adverb/conjunction) can be a confusing word at times. It has several meanings:

- **at some time in the past, but no longer**
e.g. She once was a beauty. (→ She is no longer beautiful.)
- **one time**
e.g. He plays golf once a week. (regularly, one time every week)
I will do it once only. (only one time)
- **as soon as something happens**
e.g. Once the sun goes down, the temperature drops. (as soon as)

Example from the passage:

Once a wrestler moves up to the top rank, he is not supposed to lose at all.

In this sentence, ‘once’ means ‘as soon as’.

‘Once’ also has other meanings when it is used with other words in a **phrase**:

at **once** = immediately

all at **once** = (something happens) suddenly

once and for all = completely or finally

once in a while = (something happens) sometimes, but not very often

once upon a time = a long time ago

for **once** = only this time

25C : Sentence Patterns

Contrary to...

We use 'contrary to' to introduce a belief or opinion that is true but is mistaken or misunderstood.

Example from the passage:

Contrary to its appearance, sumo wrestling is a sport that requires not only strength, but also speed and agility.

'Contrary to' is used here to correct the wrong impression:

The appearance of sumo wrestling may give an impression that it is done in a slow or clumsy way because the wrestlers are very heavy, but this is not true.

The main clause expresses the fact despite the misunderstanding.

More examples:

- ◆ **Contrary to** some people's belief, pencil is not made of lead; it is made of graphite.
- ◆ **Contrary to** the complicated look of this machine, it is rather simple to use.
- ◆ **Contrary to** your impression, Stephen is actually very shy.
